- of impact on family life and income and/or lack of access to legal support or advice.
- 3. Inequalities around access to rehabilitation services relating to people with pre-existing physical and/or mental health and behavioural conditions, communication impairment, physical and learning disabilities, or frailty.
- 4. Inequalities around poorer outcomes for looked after children .
- 5. Age related service expectations.
- 6. Approaches to engagement with rehabilitation that are sensitive to cultural differences.
- 1.3 What is the preliminary view on the extent to which these potential equality issues need addressing by the Committee?
- 1. The guideline will need to take into account that services are organised differently in different parts of the country and will need to reflect different commissioning models including considerations around rural and urban environments
- 2. We will look for evidence about effectiveness and preferences about rehabilitation service provision in selected protocols relating to lower socio-economic groups.
- 3. We will look for evidence that highlights barriers to access of rehabilitation services for specific groups covered by equalities legislation
- 4. The guideline will need to include recommendations covering rehabilitation service provision related to all ages, avoiding age related generalisations whilst still making age specific recommendations when necessary.
