

Treosulfan with fludarabine for malignant disease before allogeneic stem cell transplant

Information for the public
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Treosulfan (Trecondi) with fludarabine is available on the NHS. It is a possible option for preparing the body for an allogeneic hematopoietic stem cell transplant to treat cancer in adults, if a reduced-intensity regimen is suitable for them.

An allogeneic haematopoietic stem cell transplant is sometimes called a bone marrow transplant. The patient is given healthy blood cells from a donor, who may be a family member.

Is this treatment right for me?
