

Abaloparatide for treating osteoporosis after menopause

Abaloparatide (Eladynos) is available on the NHS. It is a possible treatment for osteoporosis after menopause in women, trans men and non-binary people if they have a very high risk of fracture.

If you are not eligible for abaloparatide but are already having it, you should be able to continue until you and your doctor decide when best to stop.

Is this treatment right for me?

- What are the risks or side effects? How likely are they?
