The percentage of babies who reached 8 months old in the preceding 12 months, who have received 2 doses of a meningitis B vaccine before the age of 8 months.

Importance

Considerations	Assessment
The Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) published a vaccination strategy in Autumn 2020 with the aim to maintain and develop the UK immunisation programme.	The indicator reflects a specific priority area identified by DHSC.
Routine childhood immunisations, including meningitis B (Men B) vaccination, are part of the general medical services (GMS) contract.	
2019-20 data from NHS Digital and Public Health England shows 92.5% of children in England were reported to have received two doses of the Men B vaccine measured at age 12 months. This increased from 92% in 2018-19. Eight regions of England achieved coverage of more than 90% and one region exceeded 95% coverage.	The indicator relates to an area where there is performance under the specified 95% national coverage, and variation in practice.
2020-21 data from NHS Digital and Public Health England shows 92.1% of children in England received 2 doses of the Men B vaccine (coverage at 12 months).	The indicator addresses under-treatment.
The Green Book states: The Men B vaccine immunises against meningococcal disease group B. Meningococcal infection most commonly presents as either meningitis or septicaemia or a combination of both. The incidence of meningococcal disease is highest in children under 5 years of age. The most severe long-term complications include hearing loss, visual impairment, communication problems, limb amputations, seizures and brain damage.	The indicator will lead to a meaningful improvement in patient outcomes.
The complete routine immunisation schedule from June 2020 states that the Men B vaccine should be given at 8 and 16 weeks old, and a booster given on or after the first birthday.

Exclusions: The Green Book states that meningococcal vaccines should not be given to those who have has a confirmed anaphylactic reaction to a previous dose of the vaccine or any constituent or excipient of the vaccine.	
NICE general practice level indicators are intended for use where there is an average of 20 or more patients per practice. PHE/NHS Digital experimental GP vaccination coverage statistics 2019-20 shows a total 12-month denominator of 625,516. This is approximately 93 patients per GP practice (6720 GP practices QOF 2019-10). There is no estimate of number of babies aged 8 months old.	The indicator does outline minimum numbers of patients needed to be confident in the assessment of variation.

Feasibility

Considerations	Assessment
The <u>routine vaccination schedule from June 2020</u> details that this vaccine is given at 8 and 16 weeks.	The indicator is repeatable.
Cover of vaccination evaluated rapidly (COVER) data is collected by Public Health England and reported quarterly and annually by NHS Digital and Public Health England including two doses of Men B vaccine by 12 months of age, and the booster by 24 months. Data is submitted by the local teams and child health record departments and reported nationally and regionally. From 2019-20 this will include general practice level coverage.

Acceptability

Considerations Assessment The indicator assesses The Green Book states that minor illness without fever or systemic upset should not postpone immunisation. if an performance that is individual is acutely unwell, immunisation may be attributable to or within the postponed until they have recovered fully. control of the audience. The two doses should be given at 8 and 16 weeks of age. The indicator measures achievement at 8 months of age but the second dose is to be given at 16 weeks of age. This allows time for missed doses. It aligns with NICE indicator IND215 that measures 3 doses of a diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis containing vaccine in babies before the age of 8 months. Patient choice to vaccinate should be considered and personalised care adjustments recorded

accordingly.

Data is collected by NHS Digital.	The results of the indicator can be used to improve practice. Practices currently submit data to NHS Digital.

Risk

Considerations	Assessment
The complete routine immunisation schedule states that two doses of the Men B vaccine should be given at 8 and 16 weeks of age. Measurement at 8 months of age allows for catch up for children who have not been vaccinated at the recommended time. An unintended consequence may be later vaccination for children who could have been vaccinated earlier. The guidance documentation should be clear when the vaccine is recommended.	The indicator has an acceptable risk of unintended consequences.
